



Answers:

- **1 c.** A portrait neckline, popularized in the 1930s, frames the upper shoulders.
- **2 b.** Duchess satin, a luxuriously heavy woven fabric, is known for its smooth texture and ultrasoft luster.
- **3c.** A blusher is a short veil that covers your face as you walk down the aisle. It's generally pulled up and back over a longer veil to reveal your face during the ceremony.
- **4b.** The dress style worn by Gwyneth Paltrow in *Emma*, an Empire gown features a low square neckline and a high waist (defined by a fabric seam) that falls right under the bustline.
- **5a.** Used mainly to provide structure to bras, corsets, and strapless gowns, boning features hidden strips of lightweight metal or plastic, which run vertically up the bodice.
- **6a.** Alençon, a handmade French needlepoint lace often used on wedding gowns, showcases floral designs on a sheer, net background. It often embellishes sleeves and necklines—sometimes with sequins.
- **7c.** Though all three are fabrics, only tulle—a fine hexagonal mesh used for veils and skirts—is on point at both weddings and dance recitals.
- **8c.** A high-low wedding dress, all the rage in the 1920s, is cut short in the front (ending just above the knees) and falls to the floor in back.
- **9a.** An elegant, medium-weight woven fabric, shantung has a distinct elongated ribbed texture that best lends itself to bridal ensembles and tailored wedding gowns.
- **10b.** This lace scarf—a fashion staple for Spanish brides—is draped delicately over the head and face and can fall to the floor in the back.
- 11c. First used on evening gowns, these small sparklers add glitter to your wedding wear. Unlike other types of sequins (which require handsewing), caviar beads are glued onto the fabric with a special adhesive.
